The D'Urso Family Donates Nature Preserve in Amagansett!

We offer our thanks to the D'Urso family for their donation of a .7 acre pristine natural habitat near Napeague State Park in East Hampton Town. The new preserve will be added to the Trust's Ship Wreck Preserve, an assemblage that includes upland pitch pine woodlands and coastal dunes featuring native flora and fauna. The property is a known migration point for monarch butterflies who rely on the nectar of seaside goldenrod -- a protected



New York State flower -- that flourishes on this preserve.

"All of us at the Trust thank the D'Urso family for choosing to conserve this fragile and sensitive piece of natural habitat. It is through the generosity of landowners and communities that conservation opportunities such as this become a reality," said John v.H. Halsey, President, Peconic Land Trust.

Hayground Farms Protected for Food

Peconic Land Trust President John v.H. Halsey is pleased to announce that the **Town of Southampton** has purchased enhanced development restrictions on **Hayground Farms**, 24.6 acres of prime agricultural soils located on Montauk Highway in Bridgehampton.



The farmland, acquired by the Trust between 2008 and 2013 from the descendants of William Haines (19.9 acres) and Jack and Gusty Folks (4.7 acres), is currently leased to farmer Peter Dankowski through the Trust's **Farms for the Future Initiative**.

The Town of Southampton had previously purchased development restrictions on all of the farmland at Hayground Farms. However, those restrictions did not assure that the protected farmland would be farmed. The latest purchase by the Town further restricts the use of the property through Affirmative and Affordable Farming Covenants and Resale Restrictions. These covenants and restrictions will ensure that the land will be farmed primarily for food production purposes as well as accessible and affordable to qualified farmers for generations to come.



We thank the Town for its commitment to agriculture and we look forward to our continued collaboration with both the Town and our farming community to assure that fresh, local food is available to all and remains a key component of our historic community character and local economy.

Wolf Preserve

In April 2003, Mrs. Lenore Wolf left an incredible legacy for the community through a testamentary gift to the Trust in her will: 20 acres of woodlands along Main Bayview Road in Southold (south of Rambler Road). Lenore's love of nature and wildlife inspired her to make this gift so that "people would have a place to breathe and renew their connection to the land." The Wolf Preserve includes habitat for a wide variety of fauna with vibrant wetlands, meadows, and woodlands. The Wolf Preserve was opened to the public in 2006 with two trails winding through the property.



East Point Preserve

Farms for the Future Initiative

Ag Capital Grant 9 Projects Pre-Approved Application Process is Still Open

Since launching last summer, nine grants have received pre-approval for funding through the \$1 million Agricultural Capital Equipment Grant program, which reimburses agriculture and aquaculture farm operations for investment in equipment and infrastructure. Eligibility details can be found on our website:

Up to \$25,000 in reimbursement is available per farm operation. Examples of the preapproved projects include:

- Paul McCormick of Green Gun Shellfish for a skiff and outboard motor to start an oyster farm in Moriches Bay
- Mays Farm in Wading River for converting its greenhouses from electric to fuel efficient and cost effective natural gas
- Kawasaki Greenhouse in Center Moriches to produce sedum mats for green roofing and
- Chris Wines of Riverhead for infrastructure costs related to converting his family's potato farm to a dairy farm for milk, including fencing, irrigation, a manure spreader for the cows and an 80-gallon milk tank.

Environmental Protection Fund Governor, Senate & Assembly Budgets Propose \$300 Million Environmental Protection Fund Passed in NY State FY 2017/17 Budget on April 1, 2016

Thanks to the efforts of many -- *most importantly you* -- we are thrilled about significantly increased funding for the Environmental Protection Fund. All three chambers -- Executive, Senate and Assembly proposed a \$300 million EPF in their draft budgets, which was carried through in the final New York State budget adopted on April 1.



The EPF funds vital programs that impact our environment: water quality programs, natural lands conservation efforts, farmland protection programs, enhanced public access to recreational lands, community gardens, grants to land trusts, and so much more. Not only does funding provide for land protection and improved quality of life, but also provides important economic benefits across the state by supporting job growth in many industries including tourism and agriculture.



In addition to news on the EPF, we would like to share information on two important legislative actions that were announced at the end of 2015:

- The Conservation Easement Tax Incentive was finally

 after 10 years -- made permanent by Congress! This
 incentive is particularly important on Long Island for
 farmland conservation efforts.
- Governor Cuomo signed enabling legislation that would allow the five East End towns to move forward with a referendum to extend the current Community Preservation Fund program for an additional 20 years, from 2030 to 2050.
